Hi, my name is Niamh and 12 years old. I am writing to tell you how I live with nystagmus. I was diagnosed with nystagmus when I just turned 1, it's a condition that makes my eyes wobble from side to side rapidly without me knowing, this also gives me a head tilt which allows my eyes to focus. Even though I am partially sighted, I don't let it hold me back from taking up opportunities. As I have been at secondary school for a while, I've been asked to talk about how I manage with my condition. When I first joined the school, I'll have to be honest, I was terrified. I always had that one feeling in the back of my head that my eyes could possibly



hold me back but as soon as I settled into Sir John Talbot School, I felt at home and comfortable. The SEN team have been an absolute god-send for me, helping me with equipment and helping me settle in. Now that I have finished my first term, I have accomplished so many things. Since starting school I have made several new friends, become a school councillor and have really enjoyed taking part in my lessons. Overall I have loved my secondary school life so far and can't wait to see what happens next. The whole reason I wanted to write about my condition today is to show all the people in a similar position to me that even with an eye condition, it shouldn't stop you from excelling in your school life.

Ophthalmology and Audiology Updates

As part of the Restoration and Recovery process at the hospital, all outpatient appointments are now being undertaken and both Ophthalmology and ENT are working through any backlog of appointments. If you have a routine appointment, that has been cancelled or due, please contact the respective hospital admin team member who may be able to give you an update. New referrals are now moving forward more regularly and there should now be no delay in picking up these cases nor in the SIS team offering support. 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Have your say on Shrewsbury's traffic arrangements

A survey is being launched to gather people's views on how Shrewsbury town centre's traffic arrangements have worked over the summer.

Since mid-June, when shops were allowed to reopen, High Street and adjacent streets have been closed to vehicles to allow room for social distancing, following advice and guidance from central government and Public Health, and for businesses to use the outside space for seating customers.

Councillor Peter Nutting, leader of Shropshire Council, said: "The most obvious change has been closing High Street to traffic during the day, and making Wyle Cop one-way, so all inward traffic has had to go around the inner ring road or along Town Walls, St John's Hill and Claremont Bank.

"This survey is an important part of the review of traffic measures this summer and will help us to decide steps we might take in the longer-term to improve transport and pedestrian movement in and around Shrewsbury."

Leader of Shrewsbury Town Council, Alan Mosley, said removing traffic had improved the atmosphere in the High Street and surrounding areas and he had heard many people praising the move. However, any future long-term measures had to be carefully considered from all points of view, he said.

"By bringing in these changes we have carried out a really useful experiment in increasing pedestrianisation beyond the Pride Hill area, which we can use to inform any future decision-making linked to the objectives of the Big Town Plan.

"It is vitally important that as many people as possible complete this survey so they can tell us what they think."

The survey will take around 10 minutes to complete and respondents can opt into a prize draw to win one of three £50 vouchers for a Shrewsbury business of your choice.

Linda Webb, Qualified Teacher for the visually impaired (QTVI)



I am new to the Telford and Wrekin Sensory Inclusion Service, but I am not new to supporting children and young people with a vision impairment!

I first learnt braille when I became a class teacher at Dorton House School for the Blind in Kent, in 1986. I loved this job, but moved away from the area and went on to other teaching posts, particularly with children who have special educational needs. I had the opportunity to study for the Mandatory Qualification for Teachers of Children with a Vision Impairment at the University of Birmingham in 2007, and have been working as a QTVI ever since, first in Herefordshire and then in Worcestershire. 
